### **RECTOR'S LETTER**

Dear Friends,

In our modern culture and society where so many seem to be determined to try and push God and Christianity to the margins, any one of us may be tempted in any of the various aspects of our lives to take off our Christian uniform as it were, and to simply become a



part of the crowd. Living for God can sometimes be hard. But set against this, living for God is always rewarding and enjoyable. And it holds out a great promise: the promise of everlasting life.

The messages of Easter should encourage us in our attempts to live for God. First, in the example of Jesus' obedience to the will of God, Jesus was obedient even to the point of death - and death on the cross. And so his unfailing obedience won acceptance with God and fellowship with God for all who believe and trust in him. For all who put their faith in him. If we are to live for God, we too, are called to obedience and must imitate the obedience that we see and hear in Jesus. And that obedience begins with faith in the Gospel and in Jesus Christ. After all, the Bible tells us that: "whoever claims to live in him must walk as Jesus did." [1 John 2:6]

Second, we need to think of the example of the disciples. When other so-called disciples judged that Jesus taught "too many hard things" the Twelve stayed with him certain that his words were the words of eternal life. Like them, we too need to hear all that he taught and to live by those teachings. To do so we must have a living, biblical faith. It is no use adopting the ways of the world and rejecting the difficult bits of the Bible, or those bits that we don't like or that make us feel uncomfortable. If we are to truly live for God, we need to hear and to live by it all.

And then, third, we need to pray more. However much we pray, I think we would all agree that we ought to pray more. Jesus prayed that he might fulfill his Father's will. He prayed for his disciples. He also prayed for all of those who would become his disciples. It seems to me that if Jesus thought it necessary to pray so much

and so often, doesn't that tell us that we all need to pray more? Living for God is difficult, but without prayer, it becomes impossible.

And finally, and as we come again to Pentecost, we must remember that Jesus didn't leave us alone. The power of the Holy Spirit, the power of the one who enables us to connect and to communicate with God, that power that the first disciples knew, is the power that is also there to strengthen, to empower and to encourage each one of us as we seek to live for God.

By living for God we can enter a new life. A life that will touch all of those that we encounter. But more even than that, as we live for God we can share something of the life of God himself. And that is eternal life: a life that is truly everlasting.

### Local Garden open for charity

# Chichester Cathedral peregrines are back

Chichester Cathedral's peregrine falcons have been seen mating and preparing for the forthcoming breeding season. The female of the pair is reckoned to be 12/14 years old.



Over the years, the peregrine falcons have delighted visitors with sightings from the Cathedral grounds from March until August, and they have amassed a significant online following, observed virtually through a livestream on the Cathedral website.

The peregrine project is collaboratively run by Chichester Cathedral, the Sussex Ornithological Society (SOS), Carnyx and local wildlife enthusiasts David and Janet Shaw, who have been observing the birds since 2001.

This year, there will be a series of drop-in Open Days run by David and Janet (all weather permitting) so that visitors will have a chance to watch the peregrines through telescopes, view live footage, and learn more about the birds and their activities. These Open Days will be taking place Wednesday – Sunday from 5th June - 7th July 2024 on the Cathedral Green.

# **News from S.E. Asia**

(received at Easter)

Dear friends,

First off, let us greet you, a **Happy Resurrection Day!** Jesus lives and so shall we! May we have a meaningful celebration of this greatest event in history.

This year started off with a trip to B's home country to visit family. Her 85-year-old mother has not been well due to cancer of her lymph nodes. Although she had this big swelling around her neck (as big as a neck pillow), she was still mobile, could go to church, supervise the cooking, and lead her home group Bible studies online. We were happy to see her in good spirits and yet we knew that her situation would just get worse, unless the Lord did a miracle. [B's mother died peacefully on 9th April. B was with her]

In March we went to Sydney, Australia. We're thankful that our speaking sessions there were well received. We also had the chance to visit that beautiful city. We enjoyed breath-taking beaches and endemic flora and fauna. I loved looking at the birds that just flew freely – lorikeets, cockatoos, kookaburras, ibises and pelicans! That was a special gift from God. In each of these different trips we were thankful for new connections made and for possible collaboration with different people.

Our social media outreach project has gone well so far. We have had quite a few people visit our page and our digital responders have had some good conversations with most of them.

A has been able to connect with the Rector of the university (in the heartland of this country) where he hopes to teach. We want to resume making monthly visits there and develop this relationship.

The house fellowship has been a source of encouragement. B and her friend 'E' started addressing each of the believers' spiritual bondage last year. They received the Word with enthusiasm and want to share Jesus with others. At the beginning of the year we had a retreat together with the believers. However, this group has had its share of difficulties – a marriage crisis, eviction from the land on which they were living, money issues and other problems.

Our children seem be doing well. Son T has finished his first semester of Medical Physics - not too easy for him but the Lord helped him. He's about to start his second semester.

Daughter Y has a few more months to go before she finishes her Orientation School. She still has not decided what to do after this, whether to study or take another gap year to volunteer.

There is so much to pray for and we want to pray big and boldly because we know that only Jesus can do more than what we can ever ask or imagine (Eph. 3:20). May we all know the power that is available to us who believe: the same power that raised Jesus from the dead. Praise Jesus, Living Son of God, Lord of the Universe, Hope of the World. Blessed be His name forevermore!

# **Ardingly Old Jeshwang Association**

The Clinic continues to offer excellent services to the residents of Old Jeshwang and indeed to the surrounding areas since the quality of care is such that it now draws patients from further afield!

Our focus at this time, as reported in previous



magazine articles, has been to supply the clinic with modern, up-to-date laboratory equipment, enabling them to process many more, and varied testing. Thanks to our many sponsors' continuing support, this we have done, with the result that not only are they no longer relying on, and paying for, other testing facilities to process tests that they previously could not, but they are now able to offer these services to other medical facilities, and charge for so doing.

The second focus is of course the extension of the existing building to provide a much-needed second delivery suite. Our architect, David Ogilvie is currently drawing up detailed plans so that the work may be put out to tender. Excitingly, his plan also allows for the possibility of a further extension, when time and funds allow, which will then provide more wards and encompassing an interior courtyard, for peaceful relaxation and recovery.

The General Administrator, Cherno Yaddeh's comments below show the importance of this next stage:

"The proposed building extension and David Ogilvie's vision for further expansion are crucial elements of our strategic planning. They not only align with our commitment to providing comprehensive healthcare services but also present opportunities for financial sustainability.

The Kanifing Municipal Council, with the regional health directorate, welcomes the idea of the labour ward expansion and has given us the mandate to proceed with the project. "

The hope and prayer is that those who have not yet heard the Good News of Jesus Christ and His love for the world, will hear it for themselves and respond and follow Him.

There are many different ways of participating in Thy Kingdom Come, but praying every day during the 11 days from 9<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> May, for 5 friends, family members or colleagues to encounter the lifetransforming love of Christ, is at the heart of Thy Kingdom Come.

Specifically, on Pentecost Sunday (19th May) young people from every corner of the nation are invited to pray the prayer that Jesus taught us - the Lord's Prayer - between 1700 and 1800 hours.

"In praying 'Thy Kingdom Come' we all commit to playing our part in the renewal of the nations and the transformation of communities." (Archbishop Justin Welby)

### SALE OF PLANTS



#### **MEMORIES OF SANDY HETT**

It was with sadness that we heard just before Easter of the death of Sandy Hett. I hope to write more next month, but here are some recollections of him:



"I would like to share a few memories of Sandy. He was a member of the church choir for many

years. He was a beautiful tenor who sat behind me in the choir stalls and I could hear his lovely singing. He was a quiet, kind, gentle, gentleman who turned up for choir practice every Wednesday on his moped whatever the weather. Sandy was also a member of the Ardingly Choral Society. We were very lucky to be in the Choral Society when it did singing tours in France and Belgium. My sister Angela and I spent a lot of time with Sandy on these tours and I remember how knowledgeable he was about the areas and buildings we were visiting. He shared this knowledge quietly with us telling us 'always look up at the tops of the buildings, it is so interesting up there'. Thank you for that Sandy, I am still doing that, thinking of you as I do it."

**Michael Denman** remembers Sandy as "A very quiet neighbour who used to come in for coffee sometimes, and was always extremely knowledgeable on many subjects – especially the village of Ardingly and its history"

I knew Sandy all my life, as he saw me grow from childhood to 2024. When he moved to Compton House he would sometimes phone me for a chat, and I was amazed at the memories he had of events, places and people from long ago. He knew that I had travelled in Europe and Turkey and told me about his own visits abroad. He was also able to tell me things about my own family that I knew nothing about, and that was quite precious. Apparently my Aunt worked at Bawtry as a young girl. I knew that my Grandfather worked on the Wakehurst estate and ploughed the fields with his big Shire horses but I didn't know that he won certificates for the best ploughing and drilling! And Sandy remembered him driving his horse and cart down the High Street, laden with vegetables and other produce from the Wakehurst estate, for the village residents. I had no idea!
