RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

There is certainly a lot of change taking place in the world at the present time. An evil regime in Syria has fallen leaving uncertainty but also hope in its wake. Several European countries face elections this year and with them the prospect of unfamiliar and more



populist parties getting closer to the levers of power. There is, too, a new government in the United States of America led by 'a new but also old face' who has returned to power leading many to wonder what exactly that is going to mean both for his country and for all of those who will have to work alongside him. In this country, our own government has barely settled into the routines of office after years of opposition and already there are cries and clamour for resignation and change. We will each have our own views about all of this and about the people and parties concerned, but one thing we must surely all agree on is the need for stable, settled and fair government all across the world.

To achieve this I believe we all have our part to play through prayer. The Bible stresses the importance of praying for "kings and all of those in authority" - even for those responsible for the persecution of Christians. The apostle Paul made this clear at a time when the church was suffering at the hands of a government led by the cruel Roman Emperor Nero. But even earlier than this, through the words of the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah, the Jewish people were encouraged to pray for a pagan government and for Babylon's peace and prosperity. The point is that we are to pray for all leaders and rulers and not just for those with whom we might happen to find ourselves in agreement. I believe that we can all play a part in bringing about the changes that are needed in this country and all across the globe by bowing down in humble and expectant faith before our sovereign Lord and praying for our country, for our leaders, for the government and Parliament and for the leaders and governments of all other nations. Praying that their response to the problems and difficulties they face will be godly, measured and wise. Surely here in the western world our prayers need also to be for a heartfelt return to the Lord.

"You do not have because you do not ask God," says the Apostle James, and in Luke 18 Jesus himself tells us to pray and to never give up! I sometimes wonder whether the comparatively slow progress towards peace and justice in the world and to the creation of fairer and more just societies for all is due more than anything else to the prayerlessness of the people of God. What change might happen if we all learned to wait upon God in believing, persevering prayer?

Of course what we actually pray for must also to be in line with what is 'right' according to the Word of God. In this country we have had the Bible for centuries and much of what our country is built upon stems from our understanding of God's Word. To throw out the Bible now and to rely instead on our own sense of fair play would be a delusion that could lead to disaster; government needs always to be grounded in God's law. But in all of that, again, it needs our prayers.

So as a New Year begins and ushers in so much change let me encourage everyone to help bring about 'real change' [to use an expression that is seemingly beloved by all politicians] by praying for all world leaders, that "we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness" [1 Timothy 2: 2] and that they will govern for God, as his agent and for the welfare of all, never losing sight of God's word and so serving his purpose of ordering our lives together.

News from Nepal

(received too late for the December/January magazine)

Dear friends,

As we approach Christmas and New Year, we wish you a very happy Christmas and a joyous, blessed New Year 2025. We plan to be the salt and light to the people during this festive season by giving them gifts and the Gospel.

Family: All of us are doing



well. I continue to lead the Church, Church Planting, Training, and the School. Shusma is very involved at Aanandit Charity Center and in teaching and preaching. All our girls are doing well in their studies. Our eldest started an internship last month.

Church: We now have 16 Aanandit Churches and held our first Annual Pastor and Leaders Seminar in October, where we ordained Pastors and Leaders. We have seen more new people coming to the churches and taking Baptisms. We are building a church hall in Mankha, a Sunday School Room at Khadichaur, and extending Sankhu church. As Christmas approaches, we have several programs coming up.

Training and Church Planting: We are conducting a month-long Leadership Training with 16 participants here in Kathmandu, culminating in a Graduation on November 28th. After that, we plan to plant a few more churches to reach 20 by the end of 2024.

Vision 2033: AD 2033 marks 2000 years since Jesus rose from the dead. Our Vision 2033 includes: 40 Churches; A New Central Church building with parking and other facilities; Sending missionaries to the Diaspora; Supporting many of God's workers who want to step into ministry.

Aanandit Charity Center: All our Ministries/Projects (Micro Business Support, Vocational Training, Youth Empowerment, Scholarship, Day Care Center, Girls Hostel, and Children Home) are doing well. We have also helped many schools and needy families during floods and landslides and trained many young people to find jobs in Nepal.

We held our AGM at the Church Centre on Sunday, 17th November where our Committee hosted the meeting, accompanied by refreshments, and welcomed not only supporters from this village and its immediate surrounding



area but also one or two sponsors who had travelled some distance to meet us and hear of our progress and future plans.

After the formal business elements had been completed including Approval of the previous AGM Minutes, Election of Officers and Adoption of Accounts, a more general discussion followed. Thanks to continued support from our many sponsors, our finances are in good shape so that we are confidently moving towards completion of our priority aim - the extension of the Maternity Suite to add another Delivery Room.

Our architect, David Oglivie tabled the drawings and explained the various modifications and extensions to the building. 2025 should therefore be an exciting year for the Old Jeshwang Health Centre!

News from Samara's Aid

REGREENING THE DESERT

The thousands of shrubs and trees which we planted over the past 2-3 years are doing really well. Some are more than 5 feet tall and we are so encouraged by this progress.



THEFTS

The situation in Syria is currently unstable and unsafe. 114 solar panels from our desert farm project were stolen before Christmas by an armed group, who arrived at night and started shooting. They also stole the new windows that had just been installed in the beautiful new outreach centre we have built to support orphans and vulnerable children in that desert area. These were significant losses to our projects, but I thank God that no one was harmed. Our team have still been able to pump water using the remaining solar panels from the strongest wells to irrigate all the trees. This week another 26 solar panels were stolen from our desert farm. The authorities responded positively when our team raised the alarm, sending soldiers to protect the remaining solar panels and equipment.

MEDICAL CENTRES

Due to a security threat one night we now lock the doors to our rural medical centre when it gets dark - until now they have stood open all night, inviting all to use this 24 hour service. Now patients now have to call if they want to be seen, and our team check the people and their details before deciding whether it is safe to let them in.

CHRISTMAS PARTIES

Our teams had to postpone some of the Christmas parties we had planned because of the security situation, but they are trying to run them as and when it's possible. We hosted several hundred children, who all enjoyed the parties and were so happy to receive Christmas presents. We were planning to <u>host 1,000 children over Christmas</u>, and are still hoping to do so, even if it takes a little longer. Our team have also continued distributing much needed aid.

CHICHESTER 950 - celebrating 950 years

2025 marks the 950th anniversary of the formation of the Diocese of Chichester and Chichester Cathedral and 1700 years since the Nicene Creed emerged.

In 1075 the decision was made to move the seat of the Bishop from Selsey to the more populous Roman settlement of Chichester, then Noviomagus. This was followed by the



construction of the Cathedral, a sacred place of worship and Mother Church to the Diocese - a flourishing Christian community that falls within the boundaries of East and West Sussex.

Chichester950' will be a year-long celebration featuring exhibitions, choral and orchestral concerts, and community events, culminating with a spectacular light show in October. The programme of events aims to highlight the Cathedral's presence as a beacon of faith, spirituality and community, and invites people to celebrate its captivating history that spans over nine centuries.

At the heart of the festivities is a fascinating exhibition <u>Religion,</u> <u>Rebellion & Reformation</u>, which runs from 14th February - 15th November 2025. The exhibition will feature nine objects from across East and West Sussex, each representing a century in history. Through artefacts, stories and pivotal moments, the exhibition aims to highlight how the Christian faith shaped, not just the Cathedral's history, but the lives of people across the two counties.

In honour of the Cathedral's renowned musical heritage, a special concert marking the 60th anniversary of Leonard Bernstein's Chichester Psalms will take place on Saturday 17th May. <u>Together</u> <u>in Unity</u> will also feature an exciting new choral composition which has been specially commissioned for the 950th anniversary.

Other events will include <u>TrinityFest on the Green</u> on Sunday 15th June 2025, a vibrant celebration marking the Feast of the Holy Trinity, to which the Cathedral is dedicated. This special day will see

Chichester city centre come together for festivities and street parties, celebrating music, food and culture.

Chichester950 will conclude with a spectacular light show during October Half Term, from Friday 24th - Friday 31st October 2025. This immersive light and sound installation will transform the Cathedral, bringing its 950-year history to life in an awe-inspiring display.

Bishop Ruth will also be leading three pilgrimages for young people between June and October. "We will be walking and talking, praying and praising, enjoying hospitality and reflecting on God's word in ancient places of worship and natural beauty."

As part of these celebrations, Cuckfield Celebrating Deanery held a special service at All Saint's Church, Lindfield, on 16th January. The church was full to hear Ruth, Bishop of

Horsham, lead the service which celebrated both the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed and 950 years of Christian worship and ministry in Sussex.

Bishop Ruth explained how the Nicene Creed came about, following "3 months of discussion by 300 bishops, whose biggest question was Who is God?" The transfiguration (Mark 9 v 2-8) helped them to understand this.

A new poem based on the Nicene Creed had been written by Laura Darrell and this was presented by video. Following this, members of the Cuckfield Deanery then gave a presentation on the history of the churches in the deanery, explaining that the gospel was originally brought to Sussex by St Wilfrid.

Two testimonies were given by people who have recently come to faith: one by Etty, aged 14, who attends All Saints Lindfield and one by Jo who attends the Church of the Presentation in Haywards Heath.

The service included some well known hymns and songs and a collection was taken to support the Year of Faith initiatives for children and young people.

MONICA'S SON

The Rector's letter this month is about prayer. The following story illustrates how prayer changes things:

Monica was a single mum with one child, a son. She was a devout believer who sang hymns over her child in his infancy and prayed nightly with her hand on his forehead. The boy grew up to see the world quite differently from his mother. As an adolescent, he become known in their North African town as a womanizer and would often be seen publicly drunk at untold hours of the night. He had an extraordinary intellect and eventually grew into a philosopher, channelling all his energy into combatting his mother's Christian faith.

Monica didn't give up. She continued to pray nightly for her son's salvation, just as she had done with her hand on his tiny forehead when she was a young mother. When he was nineteen, she had a dream through which she believed that God was promising to answer her prayers for her son. In response to her dream, she grew more intense in her prayer. A year passed, then another year, then another. There was no change. No moment of hope. No change of heart or openness to belief.

Nine years after that dream, he made plans to travel to Rome, known for its revelry and debauchery. Monica stayed awake all night in intense prayer that God would prevent his travels. Little did she know that her son had changed his plans and sailed for Rome on that very night, already on his way as she prayed.

On that trip, sitting alone one afternoon in a Roman garden, Monica's son heard the audible voice of God speaking to him. Bewildered, he opened up the very Scriptures he had dedicated himself to despising and disproving. Right then and there he surrendered his life to Jesus.

Monica's son's name was Augustine, and he went on to be considered the greatest theologian in history and a father to the early Christian church [St Augustine of Hippo].

The continued rise in general prices across food, energy and petrol is of great concern still, and practitioners are spending a lot of time helping families with budgeting and accessing other sources of support and advice. We are very fortunate to have very close links with CAP, Citizens' Advice Bureau and other more local groups which can give families specialised advice.

Please do look on our website and social media pages for information about upcoming events – we will soon be publishing this year's Open Garden calendar as well as many fundraising events which may be local to you and we hope you feel able to support.

December's work in numbers:

- 309 individual visits and 720 calls with families supporting 278 adults and 314 children
- 33 supported meetings with other agencies
- 74 group sessions held supporting 788 parents and 407 children
- 150 food deliveries made, plus 180 Christmas hampers
